When the final gun sounded the Phils had the short end of a 37-6 football game. Allan Rodd, chunky halfback, scored the only Phil touchdown on an end run in the third period.

Then a tough Toronto crew invaded the Quaker town and were set back by a vengeful Phil eleven, 14-0. Coach Bill Kidd's crew again showed power and finesse on both offense and defense. Just eight days had gone by when the Phils made the long trip to Bellaire. The trip down was very eventful as quite a few of the Quaker crew got quite sick. To top things off, the Bellaire eleven used a tough style

of play and in so doing injured co-captain Jerry Wampfler, All-Ohio Quaker tackle. The officiating wasn't anything to shout about and our fighting eleven suffered their second and last defeat of the season, 15-6.

In the next two games the Phils again tore loose, romping and stomping, to defeat Uhrichsville and Mt. Vernon by high scores, 47-0 and 33-7. The starting eleven watched the largest part of these two games from the sidelines while the under classmen took over. They proved to everyone that the Phils will have more great teams in the future.

In the annual clash with our traditional rival, Dover, the "terrifying" Quakers made a sensational entry into the "Major Leagues" and pushed the Tornado (Big Blow) team all over the field.





Against Coshocton, the Phils couldn't hit and dropped a 52-46 decision to the Redskins. Following this the Phils edged the Tornadoes of Dover 57-54 in a hard-fought battle on our home floor.

On the three longest trips of the year, Zanesville, Mansfield and East Liverpool, the Phils suffered three loses. At Zanesville the Quakers couldn't click and fell to a 55-48 loss. The highly tooted Mansfield Tigers, turned the game into a rout by romping over the Phils 79-43. At East Liverpool, a "rotten" second quarter gave the Potters the edge. In this quarter the Potters outscored the Phils 19-4 but fought for all they were worth to keep the victory in their own hands, finally coming out on top 52-47. Leggett and Meese were the big scoring factors in this game.

The Generals from Wooster then invaded Quakertown and just couldn't seem to miss the basket. The Phils lost again 71-68. Leggett again took the scoring laurels for the Gartrellmen with 30 points. Then the Phils again edged the Trojans from Newcomerstown 62-52 with Leggett and Meese pacing the attack.

At Dover the Phils lost three of the starting five




