






















The seasons have always gone through revolutions and will continue to do so. Along with the change of the weather comes the change of attitudes and activities.
















# Revolutions In Activities



All special events leave lasting memories no matter what the occasion; but when the WINTER FORMAL coincides with Valentine's Day, you know that a spectacular night lies ahead.




Later as the room begins to crowd and the thermostat rises, couples begin to leave to a late dinner and then home; always remembering the nights in the past and planning for ones in the future.















The week before the PHILA- DOVER WEEK is filled with excitement, fun, and expectation.



Keeping up the morale of the school during this week and the rest of the year, during defeats as well as victories, is the never ending loyalty of the RED and BLACK PACK.


The Pack decorates the hall and locker rooms leaving behind treats of candy, cookies, and cake for the team members.





Music has come of age at New Phila High School. The music department, with band director Mrs. Cheryl Graham and assistant directors, Mr. Jack Schmidt and Mr. Jeff Meyers, offers an excellent program. Band members not only learned the important language of music, but shared much fun and even grew a little as individuals.

This was the most spectacular season ever for the MARCHING QUAKERS — practicing long and tiring hours for style and precision. Led by the sensational first year Field Commander Karen Wulff and assistant Brenda Ruby, and dressed in the new colonial-style uniforms, the band added color and song to football games and community parades, while also participating in band shows and competitions. The majorettes, flags and rifles looked brilliant when on the field, and polished in the gymnasium, where they, along with the field commanders, performed twice during the basketball season.

The success of the band was not only community wide. The name of the NPHS band is now known around the state. In the first competition of the season, the Ohio State Fair, the band was unsuccessful, but this first disappointment was also the last. They went on to win at least one award in each remaining competition, finally, hosting the first annual field and parade competition at New Phila.

After a spectacular fall marching season, CONCERT season arrived. Composed of two wind ensembles, separately directed by Mrs. Graham and Mr. Schimdt, these ensembles also combine to form the concert band, where students learn from all three directors. This year, the ensembles participated in district competition, and hosted the district solo and ensemble contest, where New Phila musicians did excellently.

Also, the STAGE BAND was performing during this time. They participated in several jazz festivals, and, combined with the choral department, gave a charmingly authentic "CABARET".

Yet another facet of band, the PEP BAND, played at all home basketball games, not only entertaining their audiences, but spiriting Quaker fans.

The band got back in shape toward the end of the year and marched in parade competition at Alliance, two local parades, and the Bicentennial Parade competition in Indianapolis, Indiana. The New Phila Quakers were chosen by the Jaycees as the only band from Ohio, to compete against the top band from every other state, showing how far they have progressed in the music world.





## Drama



But memories are not only developed from special events



FUTURE TEACHERS OF AMERICA is a club whose main function is to help those with special needs. They do this by tutoring at grade schools in the New Philadelphia school district. Helping those with academic problems to learn and understand as much as each is capable of. While they are teaching, they are also learning.

The FOREIGN STUDENTS now living and attending school here are also both teachers and pupils. They are teaching us some of their customs and philosophies, while they are learn-

ing our language and lifestyle.

The Co Van Chau familys' present condition was decided on August 17th, 1975, when the members of the Emmanuel Lutheran Church voted by a strong majority to sponsor the reset-

tling of a Vietnamese refugee family.

The Chau family, originally of Saigon, first evacuated to Hong Kong. On this trip, many were killed and the survivors were left without food and water for three days. A Scandinavian shop picked them up and transported them the rest of the way to Hong Kong.

From there, they were flown to Arkansas, and then finally to

New Philadelphia, Ohio, where they now live.

The members of the family are their nephew, Thanh Dinh Hoang, 16; and children Huu Loan, 15; Dung Tren, 14; Thanh Loan, 8; Mai Loan, 6; Boa Loan, 2.

These students are also enjoying new friends, customs, and

activities.


TRI-HI-Y was developed to help others and to enjoy the happiness of being together. They sponsor a "big sister" activity in which they spend time with a smaller child who is less fortunate than they. They give a Sunday service at the Intensive Care Unit at Union Hospital once a month, and they go caroling at nursing homes at Christmas. The Winter Formal and Sweater Hop are also sponsored by this club. It's members are from both Dover and New Phila, and they work together to help others enjoy life a little more.



Ambitions for the future are discovered and the laws, policies, and standards for each chosen ambition are learned from books, and lectures. But where educators leave off, learning through experience begins.

YOUNG BUSINESS LEADERS are learning typing, bookkeeping, and filing. They are being taught new and faster methods to accomplish these secretarial duties. But there will be a change next year for the Junior Clerical and Steno classes. They will be going to the J.V.S. program. They will learn to operate new secretarial machines, while still maintaining their present number of clerical classes. They will also have other classes, such as history


and government. Though they will be attending a different school, they will still be New Philadelphia students and will be attending pep rallies and all other activities of this sort at our school.

putting into practice the idea "learning by doing." These students go to school half a day with two periods of DE class — learning the right way to approach customers, what to say and how to say it. The rest of the day the students work, ranging in stores from Swartz-Klines to Goshen Dairy. But DE is not the only club preparing students for their future by building up experience.

DISTRIBUTIVE JOB TRAINING is also designated for this purpose. In this

class the students learn about food nutrition and subjects relating to this. Field trips are taken to see, first hand, people performing the same kind of job they may one day hold.

QUAKER INDUSTRIAL ARTS CLUB members work hard on money making projects such as the coat check at basketball games, the garage sale held in April, and the wooden hand crafted name plates used to decorate homes. The club also participates in the Ohic Student-Industrial Arts Club convention held February 27–28. There are contests ranging from the most complete scrapebook to Technical Drafting.

The following pages feature Auto Shop, Machine, Mechanics and Welding. The 1975–76 school year was the last year for these programs at New Philadelphia High School. Next year, along with the programs from Dover and Tusky Valley, they will be a part of the \$7,-000,000 Joint Vocational School.

In 1955 a \$1,780,000 bond issue was passed, and along with a \$150,000 grant from the Timken Roller Bearing Company was used to build a new addition containing vocational shops and gymnasium, which went into use the 1959–60 school year. Prior to that, all of those facilities had been on the first floor of the main building, where the chemistry labs now are.

Over the years the vocational students have been a somewhat separate part of the school. Most of their day is spent in the vocational area, and they seldom are in classes integrated with business and college bound students. They have had their own activities also, including club parties, many fund-raising projects such as the coat racks and pop machines, educational and enjoyable field trips, and competitions at which they have had the opportunity to demonstrate their skills and abilities in specific areas.

Approximately 70–75 students from each class will transfer to the JVS when they are Juniors, where they will receive two years of special training in their chosen field. In doing so, these students will lose their homeschool identity but will still have the opportunity to be part of all the homeschool's extra-curricular activities such as band, pep club, and the athletics programs.

The impact of this change will not be great here at N.P.H.S. since it will not leave a large unbalance of classes or social activities. The

major effect will be the additional space resulting from the move, of both clerical and vocational shops. There were many possibilities of how the space could be used to best advantage. Most widely discussed were the ideas of changing the vocational area into an extra physical education facility to accomodate such programs as wrestling and girls' athletics which formerly had to utilize the gradeschool gymnasiums, and the concept of making the space into an expansive art department, equipped with tools and necessities which the department now lacks. Last January, the board made the final decision to turn the clerical rooms into a much needed Jr. High library, since the present library can only accomodate 132 students, while combined Jr. and Sr. Highs represent some 2,000. As for the shop area, it will be remodeled into a gymnasium addition where physical education classrooms can be held. The approximate cost of the entire remodeling will be around \$54,000.

As for the impact on those students who are leaving N.P.H.S. things should be very different. No students will take second place academically to college-bound ones, but all will be surrounded by fellow students with much in common, largely headed towards the same general direction. The study and work atmosphere should be excellent and hopefully all students will benefit tremendously.

While the homeschool will be gaining room for expansion, the J.V.S. students will also be gaining room for expansion. Expansion of their skills and knowledge, and expansion of their opportunities for future life. For be it high school or vocational school, all are being prepared to build a life and a future for themselves in a modern, ever-changing world.









This book will be a success only if in the future, when looking back through its pages, the memories of the events, the acquaintances, and the experiences here come alive again.







#### Reflections On Revolutions In Athletics

The 1975–75 NPHS Sports Season represents a total record of 47–83–2. Within the season the team collected 2 Cardinal Conference championships, 1 Cardinal Conference team member, 3 Sectional Championships, 3 District qualifiers, and 1 team qualifying, 1 State qualifying, and 1 tied school record. Although not a very impressive overall record, there were many fine individual and team performances. In both regular and girls' sports, Phila athletes have distinguished themselves.

Volleyball continues to be a sport were Phila girls tend to excel. New head coach Carol Rothel lead them to an 8–4 regular season record, and a Sectional championship. Best receiver and Most Valuable Player was Deb Robinson. Julie Milarcik was named best server. Phila fans can always look forward to a great Volleyball team. Phila girls excel not only in volleyball but also in track.

New coach Patty Beaber headed Girl's track team in a winning direction for '76. Fine individual performances were seen much more than in past years. The County's All-Star meet saw Sally Tucker taking 1st in the high jump while Andrea Marsh placed 3rd in the long jump and 1st in the 100 yd. dash. Phila's 880-relay team (Andrea Marsh, Desiree Richmond, Julie Crites) won 1st in that event, also qualifying them for the State Meet. Congratulations girls and Coach Beaber on a fine season.

Denny Edwards joined coaches Beaber and Rothel as new faces on the girl's sport scene.

Girl's Basketball team posted a 5–7 regular season record. Led by M.V.P. Tamie Bair who averaged 21.6 pts. per game, the girl's season was marked by change. With new head coach Denny Edwards came hard work, determination, discipline and long awaited success. With efforts directed toward tournament success the girls took the first game in the sectionals before losing their second. Edwards, the first male coach of a girl's team. led the girls to improvement through the season. Having lost two close ones to Dover in regular season, they beat Dover in tournament action.

The regular sports season opened in the fall with Cross Country. The 1975 New Phila Cross Country team finished with a fine record of eleven wins against only four losses. The squad will have five of its seven lettermen returning this year, and the athletes have set high goals for the '76 season. The highlights of this past season came in consecutive meets against Wooster and Carrollton. First, the Quakers defeated Wooster for the first time in five years. And then two days later they came back to defeat Carrollton; who suffered only one other dual meet loss in having a 16-2 seasonal record and going to the state meet. Junior Tab Huff and Senior Jeff Gold led the squad most of the season, and at the Fall Sports Banquet Gold received the Most Valuable Senior award. The other special award given at the banquet: Most Improved Runner went to Junior Kelly Dutton. Cross Country shares the fall season with Varsity Golf as well.

With a final 31–6–1 record, the Quaker golfers displayed a brilliant season. Capturing the "AAA" Sectional title, the 15 Team Autumn Classic and a 3rd in the Dover Invitational. Capt. Jeff Tedrow was awarded his 3rd letter and Gary Miller tied the school's 9 hole record with a 32. During the season Coach Kaserman was given his 100th varsity win, the first ever in Phila. The reserves also presented a fine season with a 21–4 record.

But what fall Friday night would be complete without football? Although 1976 was a rebuilding year for the New Phila football team, the Quakers pulled together and came up with a winning season. The squad's overall record was 6-4, and a 5-1 Cardinal Conference showing gained a CC Co-Championship with Dover. The Quaker defense was the strong point of the team as it allowed only 51 points the whole season. Also, in 7 Conference games, only one squad scored on New Phila's defensive unit. Josh Rapport led defense with 83 tackles for the season. On offense Matt Incarnato scored a team-high 24 points. He and Gene Penso led in pass receiving, while Ken Stiffler and Jerry Brown had the most yards rushing. There are many returning lettermen which should help give Phila another good season in 76.

When the season turns to winter, the fans turn to basketball. The Quaker cagers turned out a disappointing 1-18 season. There were fine individual efforts but they lacked consistency, and as a result the squad had a tough time getting everything together. Outside shooting was the team's biggest asset, but a lack of inside height offset it. Initial losses caused a lack of winning confidence in the players. In addition, change of systems in the middle of the season gave the Quakers a late start. Jim Thompson became Head Coach after the interim resignation of coach Stoffer. Awards were given to Senior Randy Limbacher for being the squad's top rebounder and defensive man, and being voted Most Valuable Player. Shooting percentage awards went to Bill Martin for free throws and Gene Penso for field goals. In the same season the Reserve team produced a winning record of 11-7 under Coach Larry Chaney. With the experience gained, the Quaker roundballers are hopeful of a successful season next year.

This season was one of rebuilding not only for basketball but also for the Quaker wrestlers as they won only one match in ten dual outings. The squad, under their Head Coach Doug Coutts, had only two senior members and as a result many under classmen gained valuable experience. A total of six sophomores and eight juniors lettered giving the Quakers good hopes for success in the

future. The New Phila Matmen gave their best performance of the season at the Sectional in Steubenville. The Quakers finished a fine fourth of seven squads and three individuals qualified for district competition. They were Sophomore Mitch Drumm, Junior Bruce Bernard, and Senior Rick Stilgenbauer. At the Winter Sports Banquet Stilgenbauer was awarded the Most Outstanding Wrestler and Mr. Takedown, while Bernard received the Mr. Pin trophy.

Spring brings outdoor sports, and the NPHS Tennis Team completed its season with a 6–17 record. Although not a very impressive record, first year coach Tom Andreas comments that the season could be called a success. The team played good tennis against many good teams. With a good showing at the Districts, Steve Beans advanced into the 4th round while Bruce Romig and the No. 1 doubles team of Steve Stocker and Rick Sheafer ended up in the 3rd round. This is the farthest New Phila has ever gotten. Success marked not only the Tennis season but also the Quaker Track Season.

The 1976 Quaker Track Team got a slow start but finished impressively under Head Coach Burt Beaber. The squad lost its first dual contests in two years in compiling a 4-2 record in head-tohead meets. In all three Mini-Relays New Phila finished close behind in the runner up spot. The Quakers also finished a fine second in the Dover Single Entry Meet. The highlights of the team's season came in its last two meets of the year: Sectionals and Cardinal Conference. In the Sectional Meet, New Phila triumphed for the third consecutive year and sent thirteen tracksters to the district event. The greatest achievement of the season came at the Cardinal Conference Meet. The Quakers prevailed in the seven team field and in so doing gained New Phila's first Cardinal Conference Championship in Track and Field. At the Spring Athletic Banquet, Dude McGarry received the annual Dave Milburn Scholarship. He was also awarded for being the Most Valuable to the squad and for setting a new school record in the 180 yard low hurdles. Another schoolmark was broken this season by 880 yard relay team of Ken Stiffler, Jerry Brown, Matt Incarnato and Dude

Baseball completes the spring schedule. With a new starting line up, coach Watson and his team came up with a final 5–14–1 season. Jim Harding being the only returning letterman, the team was comprised of inexperience. Harding was awarded top pitcher with an even record of 4–4. Larry Trunk received top honor of Outstanding hitter with an average in regular season of .371 and in the Conference .486. Trunk also was named top Defensive man and elected to the C.C. team. Eric Stoner received Outstanding hitter also with an average of .372.






The class of 1976 has survived 13 years of revolutions. Revolutions in music, politics, education and fads in clothing. Many of us will be going to college, some of us will be getting married and a few of us will be joining the armed forces.

As each of us go our separate ways we will always remember the years we spent in the New Philadelphia School System.

Remember in kindergarten when the rage for girls was petti-pants and peddle pushers, and guys wore high water jeans and penny loafers. In the third grade you advanced to more civilized clothing, go-go boots and fish net hose. By the seventh grade most of the girls were allowed to start wearing hose, mini-skirts and the ultimate in make-up. The ninth grade fad was the mini, the midi, and the maxi. Have you ever watched anyone try to walk in platform shoes?


Teachers even changed. In kindergarten and first grade the teachers were the disciplinarian type. Most kids were used to their mommies smacking their fingers, but grade school teachers used rulers to get their point across. When you finally advanced to Junior High, the "board" was used to enforce discipline. By the time you were in the Senior High you had outgrown "the board." They would keep you after school, or for really drastic measures — suspension.

Music had changed from the styles of Rock and Roll, made famous by the Beatles and the Monkeys, to the rhythm and blues of the southern states. Songs famous in the sixties were: "Itsy Bitsy, Teene Weeney Yellow Polka Dot Bikini", "Alle Oop Oop", "She Loves Me Ya, Ya, Ya", "We All Live In A Yellow Submarine", and "Crystal Blue Persuasion."
