








Student Life

The money earned from these jobs usually goes toward extra clothes for, yuck, school, gas money for cruisin' around, and the






















Class A Champs

Marching Band

BA Grand Nationals was the final step in the Marching Quakers successful season. At the Hoosier Dome in Indianapolis, Indiana with a crowd of 30,000 people, the Marching Quakers, one the smallest bands to compete, captured their class A championship.

This came after a long season that began when many high school students were still on vacation. In August the band had long hot practices along with a week of band camp.

When the band began its competition season at Marlington in early October. they received awards for best flags, rifles, Class AA 1st, and Grand Champion. This was to be their first of many 1st place finishes. On October 17, at the MBA competition at Morgantown .West Virginia, the band took 1st place in class A as well as best music, and best general effect. At the MBA Kings Island regional the band again received awards for best music, general effect, best auxillary, and class A champs.

These were the high points for the Marching Quakers which gave them the confidence to perform at the Grand Nationals along with 60 other bands to go for the clas A division title. On November 17 late in the evening after the 14 finalist bands performed, New Philadelphia was honored to be named class A champion.


They were welcomed back to New Phila. by a caravan of cars from well wishers and family and friends. A long season ended on a very happy note.



mony, at Grand Nationals where the band received the Division A Championship.















most worthwhile experience."







Girls' Tennis















Cause...Arson

March 4, 1990 Changed the face of New Philadelphia High School. A fire started by arson gutted the nigh school leaving a hell that was once a liorary and audio visual oom. In addition, many lassrooms were danaged by the smoke and vater, as fire fighters put out the blaze. Temperaures were estimated at nearly 2000 degrees which were hot enough o melt a steel support eam in the library suporting study hall room 29 directly above. The building looked as if it vere vandalized, as winlows and doors were ousted out to let the heat scape. The police were out on 24 hour duty to rotect the building rom further damage nd to watch for hot pots that might occur.

The plans for where igh school as well as the unior high students ould go were being forhulated Sunday night as dministrators met. The rimary goal was to get early 1600 students ack to school as soon as ossible. The Kent State ranch as well as Buckve Joint Vocational chool were the sites nosen. The week of larch 4 was used to get e plan and schedules orked out. School was begin March 12. The

As the week progressed the Times-Reporter gave prime coverage to the story and the community rallied its support to help the kids get back to school.

On March 12 NPHS began the day at 6:30 A.M. at the KSU branch.

"Every time there's a fire drill at school you think 'Why can't this be a real fire?" But when it really happens you regret even thinking that. I guess I took school for granted."

Students got off busses and began the most educational part of their high school career. Only students in other natural disasters like the Xenia tornado could have related to what the next 10 weeks would bring. Teachers were not prepared for what was in store either. Both groups would be roaming from room to room with no

place to leave their books, lunches etc.

As the weeks went by patience the and tempers grew thin. Teachers and students were tired by mid-week and it showed. Even the bright warm spring days could not make the situation any better. Fights were a common sight and a second assistant Principal was brought in o help. What was even worse was the thought hat this type of situation was going to exist for at east two more years.

As the year was ending there were two big items on everyones' mind. A Bond issue to build a new high school was go-


ing before the voters on June 19 in a special election that virtually split the community in half. The issue would raise taxes for the average homeowner less than \$100 per year for the next 23 years.

The other big question was where New Philadelphia High School would be held for the next two to three years. Again much controversy was raised as a suggestion to bus students to Canton was put before the entire school. Other alternatives were to run a split schedule with the junior high at the cleaned up Welty building.

Spring sports as well as Prom and the Senior trip to Cedar Point all went off without a hitch. The last two weeks the students had all the facilities of the KSU branch to themselves to finish out the year with the traditional exam schedule.

Although NPHS is not currently at 343 Ray Ave. it is alive and well. The future of the high school rests with voters in New Phila. Hopefully all can look back on these days as a way that the New Phila. schools became better than they were before the fateful day of March 4, 1990.


Inside the library, where all that was left were blackened remains of books that were used by all students at one time or another.




Each night, over forty Juniors gathered at the school to help decorate for Prom.




