



Stairway to Heaven








Every year the students and the community are as much of a part of the victory as the team. This year was no exception. Throughout the week Secret Seniors




Joyful Noises






















Looking Back





The QT's had a very exciting season. As always they danced for the team and helped the student section cheer.



Though there were not many student council members, they still pulled through with a winning effort.


















A Rewarding Experience











With new class advisers in the 1994-95 school year, they had a dif-


ferent point of view of ideas. There was a lot of extra help donated by the students' parents.






