



fellow students the pride in being the New Philadelphia Quakers.













well known country music artist put on what was said to be the best concert in fair history.























HEART-BREAKING LOSS



The music majority played selections from the Canadian Brass while the freshmen percussion played a toe tapping number for the audience's pleasure. But the audience's favorite


selection of the evening was presented by the Delphian Chorale titled "Yulelog on Uncle John." This song brought laughter to all ages and kicked off a great holiday season.



















The highlight for pro-































Parting Shots
